WHAT ONE OF OUR LIONS SAYS

Louise Draper is a member of Kidderminster and District Lions Club. We asked her why she joined and why she loves being a Lion.

"I was 22 and had never heard of Lions when my dad's scuba club were approached to see whether they wanted to help with the Santa float. For four years I was a Santa helper, raising money for other causes and then in the fifth year, I contacted my local Lions Club to see if I could still help even if I didn't have a specific cause. I became an honorary Lion for the duration of that year's Santa collections. At the presentation evening, it was suggested that perhaps I might like to go along to a meeting and see what else the Club got up to. My family were moving out of the area and I was looking for something to potentially fill that gap so Thursday 20th February 2014 was my first meeting. I was badged up at our 40th anniversary charter on 14th April 2014 and the rest, as they say, is history.

"I love being a Lion! I love being a part of my local community, helping at events, raising awareness, raising funds to help others in need and meeting new people. Lions isn't just a cause or a charity to me – it's home. It's where friends become family. We support each other, we attend events to support other Clubs, we work hard and we play hard.

"I'm 32 now and Lions is a major part of my life. In the five years that I've been a Lion, I've learnt and I've grown and I've met some amazing people that have turned my world around. I wouldn't be without it!"

You CAN bin this 'plastic'!

Did you notice the wrapper that your Spring issue of Lion came in?

With a little thought, we can all help to protect our planet. So mindful of the need for all of us to avoid using plastics where we can, the Lion magazine management committee has acted quickly and sensibly.

So instead of using a plastic wrapper to deliver your magazine in, we now use this 'bioplastic' one, which is made from potato starch. It is 100 percent biodegradable, compostable, recyclable and reusable; and it can be thrown away with your green rubbish.

Bioplastics are manufactured from renewable vegetable resources, and potato starch has several advantages over other vegetables because of its starch yield per acre, its neutral smell and it doesn't need the addition of a plasticizer – a substance (typically a solvent) which has to be added to produce or promote plasticity and flexibility and to reduce brittleness.

So your wrapper started off life as a potato. The potatoes are harvested, washed, grated and refined to produce starch. This starch contains amylose, the basic sugar of the vegetable world, also found in corn, wheat and

rice. It is used in many industries including the food industry (for sugar, cakes, sauces, soups and puddings), in the paper industry (to improve paper and cardboard properties), the pharmaceutical industry (to bind tablet components) and the chemical industry (to replace oil – especially for plastics).

Almost all oil-based products can be made from renewable vegetable resources as they share a common basis: carbon. But vegetables hold a major asset; they are renewable and greenhouse effect neutral.

RECIPE

- Mix starch, sugar and/or copolyester
- Heat to form a homogeneous paste
- Push through an endless screw towards a sieve to produce spaghetti-like threads
- Put threads through a water bath to cool
- Cut the threads into granules!

DISPOSAL

After being used, bioplastics (ie your Lion magazine wrapper) decompose

under the influence of microorganisms in the soil and are naturally eliminated without any human intervention.

Your wrapper should disappear within 180 days, depending on its thickness, it degrades completely into water, carbon gas and biomass (according to International Standard EN 13432).

Your bioplastic wrapper can be thrown away with your green rubbish and can become compost to be used as fertiliser. This compost can be produced in a composting plant – or in your own compost heap.

Let us know what your Club is doing to reduce its plastic use.





the Marriott, where the host night will be held.





INTERNATIONAL BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING

AUDIT COMMITTEE

1. The committee will continue to monitor and follow up on action plans.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS COMMITTEE

1. Reviewed a constitutional complaint filed by the Multiple District E (Venezuela) Council of Governors, challenging a decision of the International Board of Directors when it transferred four clubs from Aruba, Bonaire and Curacao from District E1 (Venezuela), Constitutional Area III to District 35N (Florida, USA), Constitutional Area I, and found good cause to expedite review of the complaint to Complaint Step Four of the Constitutional Complaints Procedure, affirmed the decision of the International Board of Directors in June 2018, transferring the four clubs from Aruba, Bonaire and Curacao from District E1 (Venezuela) to District 35N (Florida, USA).
2. Appointed International Director Dr. Datuk Naga to serve as the Coordinating Lion for the former District 301-A1 (Philippines) for the remainder of fiscal year 2018-2019 and provided a roadmap to the former district to follow to restore their district status.
3. Revised Chapter XV of the Board Policy Manual to update the fiscal agents in India and Japan and to move the fiscal agent policy from Chapter XV, Legal, to Chapter XI, Finance, as this policy is managed by the Finance Division and is better aligned with the duties and responsibilities of the Finance Committee.
4. Revised Chapter XV of the Board Policy Manual to move the Conflict of Interest Policy from Chapter XV, Legal, to Chapter XI, Finance, as this policy is managed by the Finance Division and is better aligned with the duties and responsibilities of the Finance Committee.
5. Revised the Trademark Policies in Chapter XV of the Board Policy Manual to add a requirement that foundations at the national (country) level must be reviewed and approved by the International Board of Directors.
6. Revised Chapter XV, Paragraph A.1.b. of the Board Policy Manual to clarify that the emblem of the association is that of each chartered club and district.
7. Revised the Standard Form District By-Laws in Chapter VII of the Board Policy Manual related to who can call a special club meeting in the event the president fails to do so.
8. Revised Chapter XV, Paragraph C. of the Board Policy Manual to provide for a constitutional interpretation that by virtue of membership in an individual Lions Club, an individual Lion is considered a member of our international association.

CONVENTION COMMITTEE

1. Established per diem allowances for appointed Credentials Committee members serving without other reimbursement, and headquarters staff attending the 2019 Milan International Convention.
2. Revised the 2019 Milan International Convention schedule.

3. Amended Chapter VIII of the Board Policy Manual with housekeeping changes.
4. Amended Chapter VIII, Paragraph E, Election Procedures.

DISTRICT AND CLUB SERVICE COMMITTEE

1. Granted protective status to the Kozhencherry Lions Club of District 318-B (India) and the Palu Maleo Lions Club of District 307-B2 (Indonesia) through April 7, 2019.
2. Approved the redistricting proposals submitted by Multiple District 101 (Sweden) and 104 (Norway) to take place at the adjournment of the 2019 International Convention and Multiple District 21 (Arizona) to take place at the adjournment of the 2020 International Convention.
3. Appointed Past International Director Elisabeth Haderer to serve as Coordinating Lion for the Republic of Albania, Republic of Kosovo and the undistricted areas of the Republic of Bulgaria and Past District Governor Daniel Zyambo to serve as Coordinating Lion for Provisional District 412-B (Republic of Malawi and Republic of Mozambique) for the remaining months of this fiscal year.
4. Extended the District Restructure and Redevelopment Grant to include redistricting proposals that are approved on or before November 30, 2021.

Revised the Redistricting Policy so that redistricting proposals that are approved during the October or November board meeting that are scheduled to take place at the close of the International Convention of the same fiscal year must hold elections before January 1, to enable the district governor elect to attend the First Vice District Governor/District Governor Elect Seminar held in February.
8. Revised the District Governor Reimbursement Policy so that the District and Club Administration Division was included in the process for approving increases in district governor budgets.

FINANCE AND HEADQUARTERS OPERATION COMMITTEE

1. Approved the FY 2018-2019 1st Quarter Forecast, reflecting a deficit.
2. Amended Chapter XXI related to Past International President mileage budget for authorized meetings, timing of submitting speaker request forms to the Travel Department, and agreed to review the current format of the visitation form for all official speakers for whom Lions Clubs International provides reimbursement of travel expenses.

LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

1. Revised the Board Policy Manual related to the Regional Lions Leadership Institute (RLLI) to prepare for future modifications to the Regional Lions Leadership Institute program.

2. Revised the Board Policy Manual related to the change in the number of instructional days for the Faculty Development Institute program from “four” to “three”.
3. Revised the Board Policy Manual to reference programs as Leadership Development and not just Leadership, including the word “development” where needed.

LONG RANGE PLANNING COMMITTEE

1. Conducted in-depth status overview of LCI’s strategic plan: LCI Forward.
2. Reviewed the committee’s charter to identify policies that should be updated and revised for action at the next meeting.
3. Reviewed and discussed the status of the ‘Africa Challenge,’ which was a resolution initially passed in April 2010 that stipulates when the continent reaches and maintains 30,000+ members, the Long Range Planning Committee in office at the time, would request the Constitution and By-Laws Committee to draft language for a constitutional amendment for Africa to be its own constitutional area at the following international convention. The challenge threshold of 30,000 was exceeded at the end of July 2018 and the area as of the September 2018 cumulative report is at 30,706 members and is continuing the momentum. Congratulations to the Lions in Africa for reaching this historical milestone.

The committee will review the progress of the continent’s membership growth at its next meeting and make a final recommendation to the board.

Lions Quest teaches social emotional learning to children in Slovakia

Lions Quest has made its way to students in Slovakia for the very first time, and now has its first Lions Quest-trained dog.

Lions in Slovakia received a US\$10,000 grant from Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) in order to create the pilot programme for Lions Quest in their country. The grant helped translate Grade 7 *Skills for Adolescence* into Slovakian and helped host workshops to train 40 teachers in southern Slovakia.

Both of the workshops were successfully completed by the end of June 2018. In addition, the first-ever Lions Quest-trained dog has completed the workshop! Endy is a guide dog for the Slovakian translator who worked the workshops. In southern Slovakia, Hungarian is a commonly spoken language and this Lions Quest training session was presented in Hungarian. With both Hungarian-speaking and Slovakian-speaking attendees, a translator was present to ensure everyone could understand the programme. Senior trainer, Gabor Papp, said: "She [Noemi, the translator] was a great interpreter. Actually, Endy the dog was to Noemi in

terms of sight as Noemi was to me in terms of hearing and understanding."

The workshops were a success, so our Foundation has awarded a second grant for US\$15,000 to continue the implementation of Lions Quest. Lions will be able to host three more workshops, finish Slovakian translation of the materials, and begin to train local Lions Quest trainers.

After the programme is fully implemented, Lions are hoping it can be accredited and added to the national registry of acceptable programmes. This will open doors to schools around the country and hopefully raise more Lion awareness, involvement and financial contributions for potential programme expansions.

The seventh grade students who are benefitting from Lions Quest will gain the skills needed to build healthy, productive lives. Lions Quest builds character by teaching kids about positive behavior, anti-bullying, drug

and alcohol awareness and service learning. They also create a positive connection to school, promoting a safe and healthy environment to continue their education.

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Raising up new voices

"New Voices means new ideas," says IP, Gudrun Yngvadottir.

Speaking to more than 1,000 delegates gathered at the 2018 International Convention in Las Vegas, Gudrun said it wasn't originally on her agenda to start a women's initiative.

"In fact," she said, "when I made my first official visits, I was careful not to touch on women's membership or leadership. But, to my surprise, wherever I went, I was asked what my strategy would be to promote women in Lions Clubs International. The women would come up to me and say how they were waiting to see what I would do. I thought to myself, 'If not me, who?' I felt this is what Lions want. So here we are!"

WHY IT IS CALLED 'NEW VOICES'

"As I travelled around the world, I saw a lot of diversity in membership and leadership between men and women. Even in many places where women were not members or leaders, they were playing an important role behind the scenes – organising meetings, running projects and managing activities. They were silently working, but did not have a voice.

"We don't have to look for women – they are there – all that we need to do is bring their ideas, their talent, their commitment to the table. They needed a new voice. And I thought this would be the right time to give them a platform so that together we can take this organisation forward."

By working with the Global Action Team, District Governors, and Council Chairs to create awareness, New Voices will identify Lions who have made a difference but whose voices have not been heard.

BE YOURSELF

Meet New Voice Global Chairperson, Sangeeta Jatia.



When Past International Director, Sangeeta Jatia, first took on a Lions leadership position in 2004, she thought she had to mimic the male leaders around her – talk like them and dress like them.

A Calcutta Midtown Lion since 1988, she was preparing for her role as district governor in 322 B1, and she



thought she should wear a suit jacket like the male leaders she knew in India where the climate is not conducive to jackets, and women traditionally wear sarees.

She ordered some jackets. She began to throw her voice at meetings, to be more aggressive, adopting the back-slapping camaraderie of the men, she writes in her New Voices online biography. She thought it would send the message to others that she was truly a leader to be listened to.

But she soon learned that the Lions were not impressed with mimicry. They appreciated her for her different ideas that she expressed in her quieter, feminine voice. She realised the voice she really needed to listen to was her own.

She stopped trying to fit in.

“Being authentic was liberating,” she says.

Now, as the Global Chairperson for New Voices, Jatia encourages women to not be like her, but to be themselves.

She also erroneously believed the divide in how men and woman behave as Lions was only present in small, conservative towns, she says. “But to my surprise it is in every culture, in every place. Many women did not know they could be Lions. They came to projects, worked at meetings, but did not have a say in club affairs. Even now, you have to tell them ‘you can lead.’”

“They need mentoring. They need a nudge. And once they get involved, there is no looking back.”

Jatia suggests Lions work to make clubs and districts women-friendly, with late evening meetings and Sunday meetings that include family. Lions need to be the ones to educate society that Lions are indeed both men and women. And while these Lions – men and women – work daily to meet the needs of all those they serve, she says, “We need to understand the needs of each other.”

However, it became apparent that many of the children in the project had difficulty reading because of serious eye infections. So with around 4,000 children likely to be similarly infected by drinking water contaminated with bacteria, the Laoac United Lions Club of the Northern Philippines initiated a pump wells programme.

A pump well installed in one of the schools not only provided clean water but also enabled the children to grow vegetables and the Laoac Club provided 12 varieties of vegetables to each of the villages to encourage the community to help themselves.

Second Vice District Governor 105 W, Ben Manluctao, has close ties with the Laoac Club, which enabled Tetbury Lions to donate £2,000 to the project. This will fund at least two pump wells, depending on how deep they have to be drilled. Each pump well requires little or no maintenance and should last up to 30 years.

Lottery grant secures Ironbridge Lions event

Thanks to all the lottery players and 'Awards for All', Ironbridge Lions and Ironbridge Rotary are now financially secure for their third successive PSA screening event.

Their previous two events saw 1,200 men screened FREE for this disease. At these events, 132 men were advised to seek further medical advice. The retired consultant who advises the event organisers, estimates that between 50 and 60 men have had their lives saved by diagnosing prostate cancer early.

The next event will be held at the Abraham Darby Academy, Madeley on 23rd March 2019.


Portishead Lions promote diabetes awareness

Men's Shed Group at Marie Curie Hospice, West Midlands



Care and support through terminal illness

WHAT IS A MEN'S SHED?

Men's Sheds (or Sheds) are similar to garden sheds – offering a place to pursue practical interests at leisure, to practice skills and enjoy making and mending. The difference is that garden sheds and their activities are often solitary in nature while Men's Sheds are the opposite. They're about social connections and friendship building, sharing skills and knowledge, and of course a lot of laughter.

Although labelled sheds, they often aren't sheds at all. They can be empty offices, Portakabins, warehouses, garages, and in at least one case, a disused mortuary. Some Sheds are purpose built workshops, but they rarely start out that way. Many don't have premises at all in the beginning and instead form a group that meets regularly for the social connection, company and camaraderie until they can find somewhere to kit out with tools.

Many Men's Sheds get involved in community projects, for example; restoring village features, helping to maintain parks and green spaces, and building items for schools, libraries and individuals in need.

Research has shown the negative impact of loneliness and isolation on a person's health and wellbeing. Recently, more evidence has come to light that shows loneliness and isolation can be as hazardous to health as obesity and excessive smoking. Surveys from mental health charities are finding that millions of people report feeling lonely on a daily basis.

Men, typically, find it more difficult to build social connections than women, and unlike women of a similar age, fewer older men have networks of friends and rarely share personal concerns about their health and personal worries. It is not the case for all men, but for some, when retirement comes, it can feel as if personal identity and purpose is lost. Men's Sheds can change all of that.

THE MEN'S SHED GROUP AT MARIE CURIE HOSPICE, WEST MIDLANDS

The Men's Shed project is being supported by seven of the Lions Clubs in the Solihull area, who have raised money towards the £10,000 needed to build and kit out the shed at the Marie Curie Hospice, West Midlands.

The Men's Shed will be used by local bereaved men. There are 15 men currently meeting at the hospice who are being supported by two volunteers. In essence, it is a meeting point for men who have lost their partner and who want male company.

One of the two shed units being acquired will be used as a meeting place when, over a cup of tea the men can just talk to someone else about whatever they like, be it football, the weather or the burning issue of the day.

The second shed will become a carpentry workshop where, under the supervision of one of the volunteers who used to be a woodwork teacher, they can make or mend.

The sheds can be and do, whatever the men want them to. The aim is to help the men to develop relationships with others in a way that is natural for them and this can have huge health benefits, reduce the risk of social isolation and loneliness and meet the unanswered needs which bereavement brings.

While the project at the Marie Curie Hospice, West Midlands, is being driven by bereaved men, for bereaved men, it can also be a perfect refuge for a male patient who just wants some male company away from the main hospice, even if it's only for an hour or two.

LION BRIAN HORNSBY

The idea for the shed came from Lion Brian Hornsby, who was a member of Balsall Common Lions club for over 40 years and died in October 2018. He fought bravely for 10 years against prostate cancer and its side effects. Lions Doug Cross (Solihull Lions Club) and Bob Thurtle (Knowle & Dorridge Lions Club) have worked hard to help the hospice bring the project to fruition.

- Six Clubs have donated £4,250,
- Balsall Common Lions have have donated £2,400 (to date),
- Friends of Lion Brian Hornsby have donated £1,100,
- Probus, Funeral Directors have sent £624 to the Marie Curie Hospice, and
- Balsall Common Lions have pledged an additional £1,626 when required in building phase bringing the total to £10,000, as shown on the cheque in the picture.




Worthing Lions host the Visually Impaired Bowls National Triples

However, if nice people say kind things or do kind things for the nasty people, then unkind people may feel happier and then might want to be nice too.

There are a lot of poor countries running out of food and clothing supplies, and

there is a lot of crime, fighting over the food and clothing supplies. There are a lot of charities trying to help people in the developing countries survive. We can do things for these poor and developing countries, such as raising money for charity, by doing cake sales and small parties and a lot more. If more people do things like this, people in poor and developing countries can get food and clothing to survive. This would be an act of kindness.

Sharing, in many people's eyes, is an act of kindness. Some people may want to do something in their life that they may not think will ever happen, but sharing is something that can give people opportunities in their life. For example, if you have a guitar, and you let somebody play it, they may want to learn how to play the guitar. Since the competition began, more than four million young people from 100 countries worldwide have participated.


The young artists are free to use a variety of mediums and often, the finished work portrays the young artists' life-experiences and culture.


All the district winners were judged at Lions HQ in Birmingham in November, where an overall UK winner was selected and sent off to Lions International HQ for the International judging.

Ivybridge Lions donation towards chair lifts

Ivybridge Lions Club have donated to a ground-breaking new project to provide chair lift equipment for NHS South Western Ambulance Service Foundation Trust (SWASFT) voluntary Community First Responders (CFRs).

A team of specialists looked to provide additional care for their patients in the lower priority Category Four, using the support of existing CFRs who are trained, governed and dispatched by the Ambulance Service following a 999 call.

Category Four calls have a response time target within 180 minutes, and typically involve patients who have fallen, but are not considered not to in be life threatening situation.

This project has enabled SWASFT CFRs to undertake specialist training and provided them with the lifting equipment to help patients much quicker. Hundreds of patients have been helped, meaning they are not left on the floor unnecessarily. It also frees up the emergency ambulances to remain available for the life-threatening calls.

On receiving the much-needed water KEY's manager Helen Rawling was over the moon. After their Tuesday kitchen she enthusiastically thanked Derwent Lions adding "Lots of water has already been taken but we still have plenty left to be handed out at our future sessions (Tuesdays, Saturdays and Sundays)."

Lion Ken concluded "I was delighted that our plan came together for the benefit of those less fortunate. I am grateful to Run for All for their contribution and I am hopeful that we can expand this venture going forward. It is a win-win for all."


After the trip, Penry wrote a thank you letter to Black Mountains Lions, saying:


